FROM THE SECRETARIAT

The Australian Catholic Social Justice Council is now preparing for the release in September of the Australian Catholic Bishops' Social Justice Sunday Statement. The Statement, *Violence in Australia: A message of peace*, speaks of the violence that we see in ourselves, in our communities and in our nation, and reminds us of the message of peace that Christ came to bring to us.

In the Gospel of St Matthew, Jesus says:

You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.'...
You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy.'
But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you ...

The Statement considers anger and violence in our society from three perspectives: in the individual heart, in our families and communities and on a national scale. It also reminds us that peace and peace-building are more than simply the absence of conflict:

They are positive, constructive ways of living that require constant nurturing, and that reflect the sacredness that is in the deepest part of our being - the sacredness that is the presence of the God of peace in our world.

Both anger and the path to peace begin in the individual human heart. Anger is a natural response to loss, frustration and injustice. The Statement also makes the point that anger has roots in our acquisitive culture, which encourages us to believe that we should desire material things, with the result that we can feel angry and alienated when our material expectations are not met. Modern society also promotes the message that we should be strong, individualistic and competitive and that people can be divided into winners and losers. But for every winner there is a loser, frustrated, disempowered and angry.

The home can be the place where we learn about peace and peacemaking, yet at times it can also be the place where terrible violence takes place. Looking at the wider community, we are well aware of reports of road rage, of violence exacerbated by drugs or alcohol, or attacks on strangers - often vulnerable or marginalised people.

We Australians also need to acknowledge the legacy of violence in our own history: our convict past; the violent dispossession of Indigenous people; instances of racism. In our own time we can think of the language of antagonism and confrontation in the media and in parliament, and of the demonisation of groups such as asylum seekers.

Yet our faith teaches us that peace triumphs over violence. Jesus Christ brings us a peace the world cannot give. The example of Jesus as peace-maker is everywhere: his command that we welcome children into our midst; that we walk two miles with those who force us to walk one; that we love our enemies. He seeks out the marginalised and the rejected

and makes even the hated Samaritans part of his story. He becomes the victim of the worst violence that Roman society can perpetrate, but triumphs over death and turns the ultimate defeat into the ultimate victory. Inspired by his resurrection, his disciples embark on a mission to bring the Good News that changed the world utterly. There are so many who have answered the call and followed the path of Christ in working for peace.

This Social Justice Sunday, we will be asked to reflect how we can respond in concrete ways to the Gospel's call for peace in Australia today. The Statement asks a series of questions about how we can work for peace at all levels - as individuals, as members of the community and as citizens of the nation.

MIGRANT & REFUGEE WEEK: 23 - 29 AUGUST

The theme for Migrant & Refugee Week is 'Minor Migrants & Refugees'. The Australian Catholic Migrant and Refugee Office (ACMRO) has issued a resource kit entitled: 'I Was a Stranger Until You Welcomed Me'. The kit takes the form of an educational resource primarily, but not exclusively, for children. The first six days of the week (Monday to Saturday)

are each assigned a theme related to migrants and refugees and these are accompanied by a relevant scripture, educational information, activities and thoughts for reflection. Bishop Joseph Grech says, 'Special pastoral concern needs to be given to those children who emigrate because of war, ethnic or religious conflicts and economic necessities and children who are kept in refugees' detention centres ... Children often become the target of shameful exploitation.

It is necessary to undertake and promote the welfare of all of them ... Pastoral concern urges us to implement initiatives with the aim to educate the community on the reality of minor migrants and refugees present in our communities, in detention camps and throughout Australia.'

The RCOA has released three new reports on refugee settlement issues, which draw together the findings of research conducted by RCOA over the past two years.
